# Dumont Tree Ordinance:



In continuing the effort to protect the trees in our town, the Borough of Dumont has passed an amendment to the Shade Tree ordinance. A permit is now required before ANY tree greater than 6 inches in caliper or 10 feet in height can be removed within

the Borough of Dumont. This ordinance applies to trees on private property and to town trees. Before any tree can be removed, the homeowner or contractor needs to get a permit from the Building Department.

There is a fee of \$25.00. Following the application for a permit,

the Dumont Shade Tree Commission will inspect the tree to certify the jurisdiction of the tree and determine if the tree is on private property and therefore can proceed.

The application process will be completed within 5 days of the application request.

We will be gathering and entering this data into the i-tree computer developed model. # News from the Trees: From a Certified Tree Specialist Top 10 Don'ts

#### **NEVER:**

- 1. Do nothing to your trees
- 2. Prune and removals yourself
- 3. Hire a tree surgeon instead of an arborist
- 4. Have trees removed instead of pruned
- 5. Have your trees topped
- Have your trees incorrectly pruned
- Excessive crown elevation over-thinning or lions tailing the crown elevation

- 8. Underestimate construction damage
- or landscaping damage
- $9\,.$  Install too much mulch or create volcano mulching
- 10. Install foreign material around
  through or into your tree
