Bricks cost \$100 for each installed brick.






Adopt-a-Tree Program || Free for Dumont Residents

Homeowners can apply to the Adopt-A-Tree program at any time. The Shade Tree commission will purchase and plant trees at no cost to the homeowner. Adopt-A-Tree is for planting along the curb as a Borough Tree. Planting trees in the Borough Right of Way is the sole responsibility of the DSTC. Property Owners may apply to the Dumont Shade Tree Commission to voluntarily plant a Tree or Trees in the ROW abutting the Private Property. Once planted, the homeowner must agree to water and watch over the new trees.

When applying for the Adopt-a-Tree program, please include the following important information about where you want us to plant the tree: location of any underground sprinklers, overhead wire locations, nearest trees, adjacent sidewalks, driveway or other hard surfaces, and any structures. This will help us determine the right tree to plant. Utility mark-outs will also be ordered prior to planting.

Generally planting is done once in the Spring and once in the Fall. When the trees are planted, they are mulched properly "like a donut or dish, not a volcano!" and a watering bag is provided, so that the homeowner can fill it with a hose or watering can (at least once/week, more during the first hot or dry summer). Then the water will drip slowly down to the roots to encourage a healthy start to the tree. Thanks go out to **Sally Tayeb** who planted, nurtured and delivered over 100 of these precious baby milkweeds to help the monarchs in Dumont.

From the President's Desk:

As we slowly emerge from the devastating effects of the global pandemic, some lessons have emerged; life is fragile, everyone is connected, the actions of each one of us affects all of us. Far too often as Americans we talk about personal rights and individual rights, but far less often about personal responsibilities. It is always easy to parrot the notion that as an American I can do what I want when I want where I want. It seems that "personal liberty" is invoked when someone doesn't want to acknowledge that those liberties infringe on someone else's liberties. We have an obligation, a duty, to take actions that incorporate the good of the community, the good of our neighbors. We wear a mask not only to protect ourselves, but to protect our neighbors. We get vaccinated for ourselves and for those that can't. We are all connected. Sit in your backyard and look around. Do your neighbors have trees that shade your yard? Those trees mitigate flooding so your basement remains dry. Those trees produce oxygen that you are breathing. Do they have the right to chop down their trees? Sure. Do they not also have an obligation to understand the impact of cutting down trees? People invoke the idea that it doesn't matter if I cut down one or two trees. What if your neighbors feel the same and cut their trees down? What if everyone cuts down their trees? Will it affect you? Will it affect the town? The planet? What noted naturalist John Muir said is true, "When we try and pick out anything by itself, we find it hitched to everything else in the universe."

Dumont Tree Ordinance:



In continuing the effort to protect the trees in our town, the Borough of Dumont has an amended Shade Tree ordinance; Ordinance 1503 6/21/16. By law, any resident must apply for a permit—\$25.00 fee —through the Building Department before ANY tree greater than 6 inches in caliper or 10 feet in height can be removed within the Borough of Dumont. This ordinance applies to trees on private

property and to town trees. Following the application for a permit, the Dumont Shade Tree Commission will inspect the tree to certify the jurisdiction of the tree and determine if the tree is on private property and therefore can proceed. Failure to apply for a permit prior to removing a tree will result in a fine. Removing or damaging a borough tree will result in penalties. Our goal is to preserve the canopy in Dumont. The canopy protects all Dumont homes during winter and summer by providing shade and absorbing water.
